James talks (and teases) with his colleagues and proudly explains to the Community Link staff what he's working on at The Republic of Tea. He is so proud to earn a paycheck outside of Community Link. Jim is much quieter and will give answers when prompted with questions. He too is delighted to be earning additional money.

Dave Shrum, Minister of Continuous Improvement at the Republic of Tea, supervises both James and Jim. He is quite pleased with both men and is considering hiring two more from Community Link.

PROBLEM SOLVING AT ITS FINEST!



Individuals that work in Community Link's production department assemble and pack small parts for a variety of companies. Some people use jigs to assist with counting parts. A jig's primary purpose is to provide repeatability and accuracy.

Gail S. has cerebral palsy, which makes it difficult for her to fully flex her hand, wrist and speak. She struggles placing parts at the end of the jig opposite to her. When Gail found out that Community Link's maintenance staff created rotating jigs years ago, she was inspired to find something that would work for her.

Gail gestured to her program manager to follow her to the production floor where she pointed to one of the jigs that a colleague was using. This jig was different from the others because it had a small rotating disc affixed to the bottom allowing it to rotate while sitting on the table. Gail pointed at the jig, then to herself, then to her program manager. She was indicating that she wanted a similar arrangement for her work area.

After she suggested the idea, her Program Manager researched items online and settled on a rotating turntable to fill this need. The items were placed on Community Link's Amazon Wish List and within one hour the entire request had been filled. When informed that the item was ordered. Gail was elated at the mere prospect of being able to turn her jig on her own.

When the item arrived and the equipment was set up, Gail was so ecstatic that she nearly leapt from her chair. After using the jig with the rotating turntable for just two weeks, Gail doubled her normal work output. But even more importantly, she is able to maneuver her own work equipment without having to ask or wait for someone else to do it. What's most impressive is that Gail came up with and initiated this plan. Now that's a self-advocate!



Barb Nelson was named the interim executive director while the search committee carefully interviewed the best candidates to permanently fill the position. Lynn Huelsmann was named executive director in May and she has done a wonderful job transitioning into her new role.

The Buddy Walk continues to grow as our most pinnacle event of the year. Our event in Breese has grown to be the 11th largest Buddy Walk in the country, competing against metropolitan cities such as Indianapolis and Cincinnati. Our community can take great pride in their participation and generosity. We continue to focus our efforts in expanding the Buddy Walk as we continue to grow its size to draw the attention of the St. Louis media.

Community Link strives to play a proactive role in dealing with changes to our legislative landscape. Ultimately, our goal is to have as many of our participants working in the community as possible. They enjoy earning their paychecks and although we have some participants working outside of Community Link, we continue to provide the majority of employment opportunities through our workshop.

We ask for your help identifying jobs for our participants out in the community. As part of our plan to fulfill this vision. Community Link will open a café called The Red Porch in New Baden. The Red Porch will serve as a place for participants to learn job skills so that they can find long-term employment in the community. This venture would not have been possible without the help from our friends at Clinton Manor.

Last year we highlighted a beautiful home in Nashville as our next CILA expansion. This home, a gift from the children of Jerry and Marilyn King, is set for participants to move in very soon.

Community Link continues to enjoy excellent financial health and experience great success as we continue to target resources outside of government funding. Our endowment, managed by the Special Needs Foundation For Community Link, continues to grow because of your generosity. Recently, a successful gala was held which raised nearly \$70,000, eclipsing our first year goal of \$50,000.

Our success is based on the wonderful partnerships that have been formed with individuals, families, and businesses in the communities in which we operate. It is because of your support that Community Link is able to continue to flourish in providing so many services to individuals who need them most.

The past year has been one of many successes. We hope to build on the success of the gala and the upcoming grand openings as symbols that Community Link will not merely sit back as our surroundings change. Our leadership team continues to actively identify new ways to better serve our participants.

As the Buddy Walk approaches, I challenge you to bring a guest to help us increase our numbers and grow our event. We may not have the population base of some of the larger cities that host other Buddy Walks, but with the commitment and generosity of our area and you answering the challenge to bring another individual or family, we know that we can continue to climb the rankings.
